On behalf of the Board of Directors, I am pleased to present our 2025 Annual Report and reflect on a year of significant progress in our mission to end homelessness.

Housing instability continued to affect individuals and families across the nation and in our own community last year. In response, Crossroads remained steadfast in delivering housing-focused programs and services with compassion, dignity, and respect. These efforts allow us to provide temporary emergency shelter to 1,642 people and help more than 2,300 of our neighbors secure or maintain permanent housing.

Our impact is made possible by a strong financial foundation and a commitment to responsible stewardship. Despite a complex operating environment that includes multiple programs, funding sources, and affiliated entities, Crossroads maintained strong fiscal oversight, once again securing an unqualified independent audit opinion. In addition, we earned Candid's Platinum Seal of Transparency, the organization's highest recognition for accountability and openness.

This responsible stewardship helped ensure that donor investments translated into meaningful outcomes for the individuals and families we serve. We are proud to report that 88 cents of every dollar directly supported programs and services that helped thousands of Rhode Islanders rebuild their lives and achieve stability through access to safe, affordable, and respectful housing.

Despite new and constant challenges, Crossroads maintains an unwavering commitment to this work. Your continued partnership, generosity, and belief in our mission is critical to our work—thank you.

Over the past year, our organization witnessed both remarkable progress and extraordinary need in our community. Thanks to the dedication of our staff, supporters, partners, and volunteers, we continued to advance our mission to help those experiencing homelessness secure stable homes.

One of our proudest achievements was the completion of our new Summer Street Apartments. With 176 one-bedroom apartments, Summer Street is now home to nearly 200 formerly homeless adults. This beautiful new building now stands as the largest permanent supportive apartment building in New England, offering stability, dignity, and opportunities for new beginnings for those most in need in our community.

Last year, we also broke ground on our 35-unit Health and Housing apartment building. When complete in late 2026, this innovative facility will help us better meet the needs of medically vulnerable adults experiencing homelessness.

Across all of our programs and services, we served nearly 4,800 men, women, and children in 2025. Yet the challenges before us remain significant. Demand for homeless services continues at near record levels, shelter capacity remains insufficient, and uncertainty surrounding potential federal funding cuts threatens critical resources.

Even in the face of these challenges, we remain steadfast in our commitment to ensuring every person has a place to call home. Thank you for standing with us in this important work.

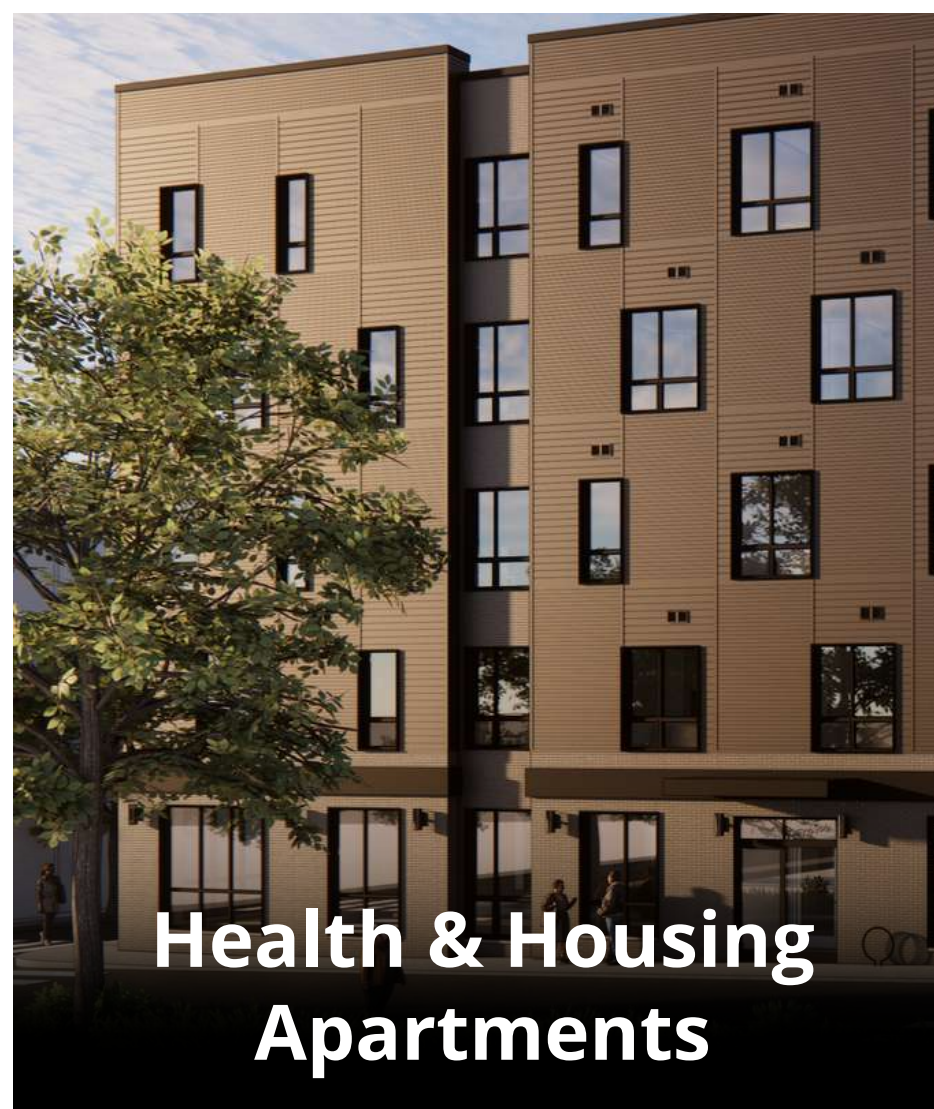

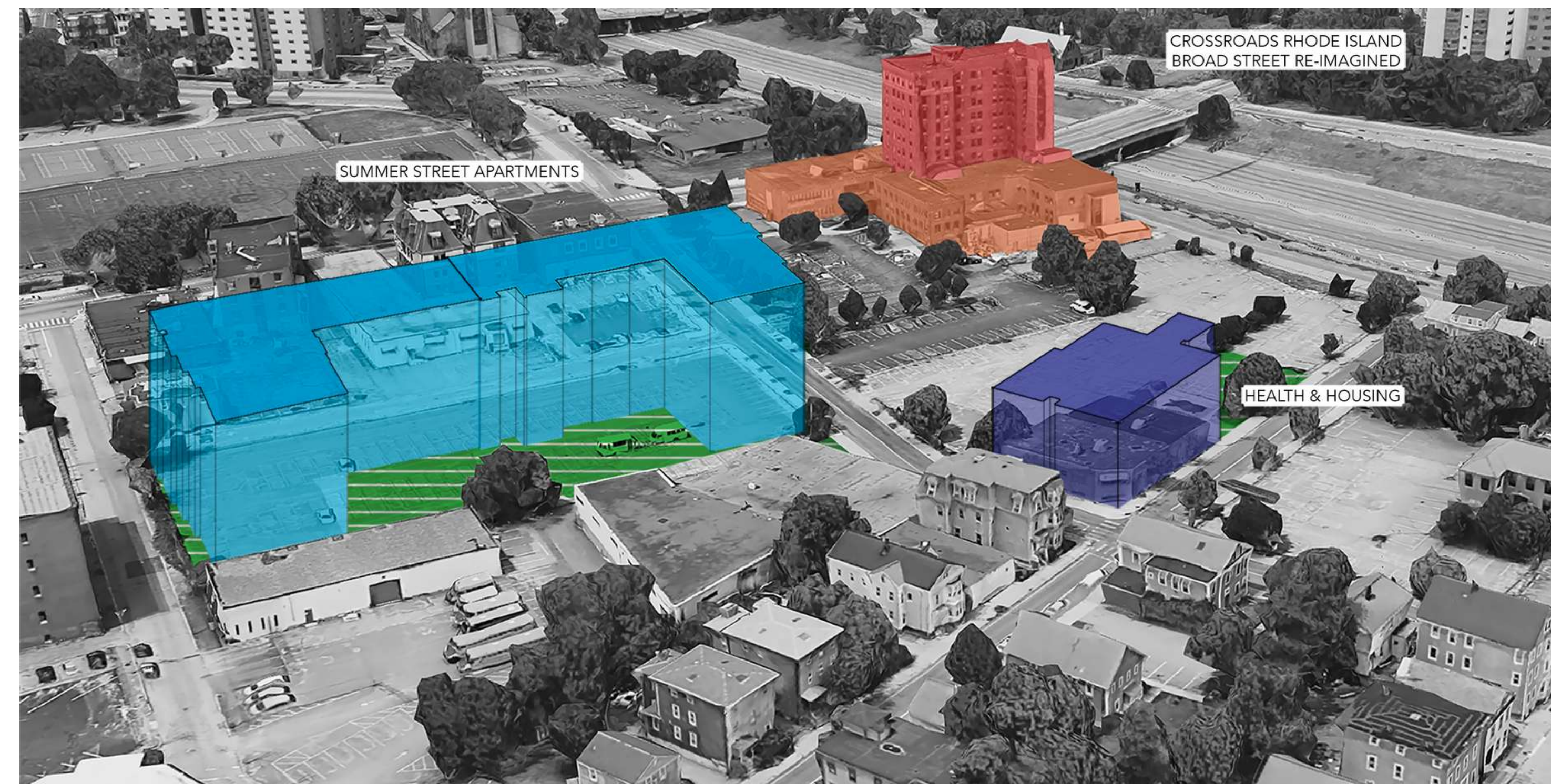


**Broad Street
Reimagined**

At Crossroads, our mission is to help those experiencing homelessness secure stable homes. Unfortunately, decades of underinvestment have left Rhode Island without enough affordable housing units—and since the pandemic, rents have soared, pushing even more individuals and families into homelessness.

To meet the growing need, we kicked off an ambitious effort several years ago to create 300 permanent supportive apartments across three buildings in Providence, including:

- Summer Street Apartments, 176 beautiful and affordable one-bedroom apartments;
- Health and Housing Apartments, an innovative, 35-unit apartment building for medically vulnerable adults experiencing homelessness; and
- 81 one-bedroom and studio apartments at 160 Broad Street.



Leveraging a combination of public funding and private philanthropy, this transformational investment is about more than housing. It's about restoring dignity, strengthening our community, and creating pathways to stability and opportunity.

When complete in 2028, our multi-phase housing development effort will revitalize the neighborhood and provide hundreds of formerly homeless adults with the housing and supportive services they need to thrive. As you'll read in the pages that follow, last year we reached a major milestone in realizing that vision with the completion of our Summer Street Apartments, the first of our three-building initiative.



SUMMER STREET APARTMENTS

COMPLETED FALL 2025 | PROVIDENCE, RI

After years of planning and partnership, we were thrilled to complete construction of our Summer Street Apartments in October 2025.

Now the largest permanent supportive housing development in New England, Summer Street provides nearly 200 formerly homeless adults with a beautiful, affordable place to call home. Each one-bedroom apartment features a private bathroom, kitchen, and living area—creating a welcoming space where our residents feel safe, comfortable and truly at home.

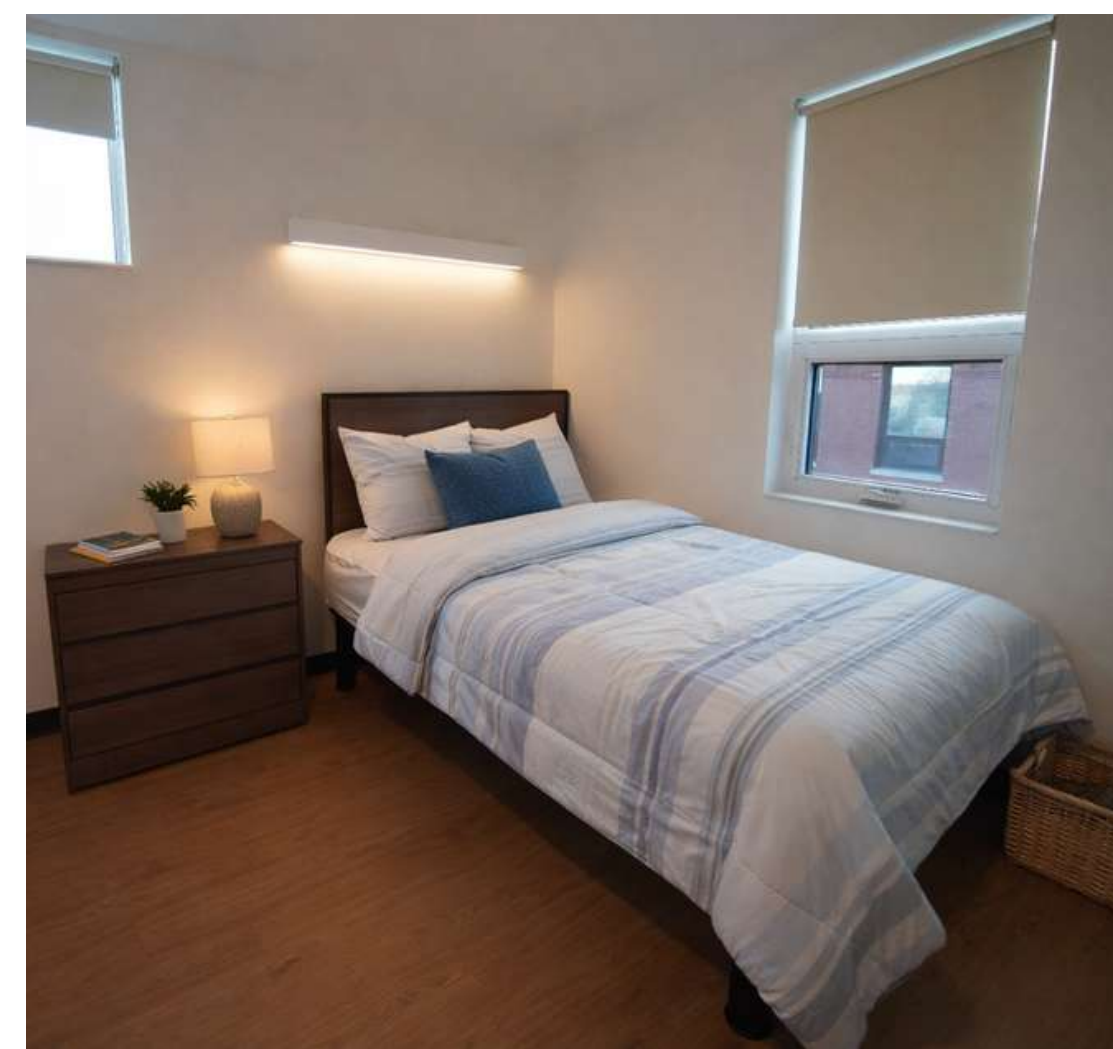
The building was thoughtfully designed to foster community and belonging, with gathering spaces on every floor, outdoor green space for residents to enjoy, and convenient access to healthcare, transportation, and employment resources.

Thanks to innovative green building practices and a combination of on-site solar power and off-site wind, the net zero building also generates enough clean energy to meet 100 percent of its operational needs.

Most noteworthy, however, is the marked increase in residents asking for education and employment training and connections to health, mental health and other providers, which demonstrates that getting someone stabilized in housing gives them a strong foundation from which they can rebuild their lives.

DOMINGO'S STORY: COMING HOME

Before moving into the Summer Street Apartments, Domingo spent two years living in a single-room occupancy apartment at Travelers Aid Housing, also known as “the Tower.” Prior to that, he experienced homelessness for more than a decade, cycling through shelters and living on the streets from the age of 21 to 35.

“When I found out I had an apartment of my own, I was in tears,” Domingo shared. “I couldn’t believe it. It felt like such an honor to be given the opportunity to live at Summer Street. My life has been incredibly challenging, but this feels like a reward. I still have to remind myself that I deserve to be here, that I’m no longer homeless. Sometimes it still feels like a dream.”

For most of his life, Domingo lived in survival mode. He experienced abuse from people who should have protected him and faced extreme violence on the streets. “Every day felt like I was just trying to stay alive,” he said. “Now, because of Crossroads, I finally feel safe and I have the chance to make positive changes in my life.”

Domingo credits Crossroads’ Housing Assets team for helping him reach this milestone. “If it wasn’t for Elexsis and Steve, I would still be on the streets. They deserve an A+ for everything they’ve done to support me.”

Today, Summer Street represents more than housing for Domingo. It represents safety, stability, and the belief that a different future is possible. For the first time in a long time, he is not just surviving. He is home.

HEALTH & HOUSING APARTMENTS

UNDER CONSTRUCTION: COMING LATE 2026 | PROVIDENCE, RI

On nearby Pine Street, construction of our innovative Health & Housing Apartments is also well underway. We broke ground in June 2025 and when complete in late 2026, this transformative facility will help us better meet the needs of medically vulnerable adults experiencing homelessness, many of whom have complex health, mental health, and other challenges.

Thoughtfully designed to promote healing, dignity, and recovery, the building will feature 35 permanent supportive apartments for unhoused adults with complex medical needs. Each apartment will include open-concept living spaces, grab bars, roll-in showers, air purification systems, and other human-centered, accessible design elements that meet the diverse needs of our residents.

The property will also include co-located space for health and/or mental health partners, a dedicated healing garden with rehabilitation walking paths and calming water features, creating a peaceful and restorative environment that supports wellness, stability, and long-term recovery.

This work builds on an important milestone achieved last year: Crossroads' certification by the National Institute for Medical Respite Care. The certification recognizes that Crossroads and our respite partner Brown University Health demonstrated a high degree of fidelity to national standards in the field of medical respite care—a meaningful testament to the commitment, expertise, and collaboration of both teams.

BROAD STREET APARTMENTS

IN THE PIPELINE: COMING 2028 | PROVIDENCE, RI

Also in our construction pipeline is the complete renovation of our Travelers Aid Housing Tower at 160 Broad Street into the Broad Street Apartments.

We plan to begin redevelopment in 2027 and when complete, 81 much needed one-bedroom and studio apartments will be added to the state’s housing inventory.

In addition to creating more housing, Crossroads also partnered with KITE Architects and TRAC Builders to undertake a comprehensive redesign of the exterior of our more than 125-year-old headquarters, which abuts Travelers Aid Housing.

Made possible entirely by private philanthropy, the end result is Broad Street Reimagined—a multi-year initiative designed to enhance the local neighborhood and improve safety, dignity and well-being for individuals experiencing homelessness along one of the city’s busiest corridors.

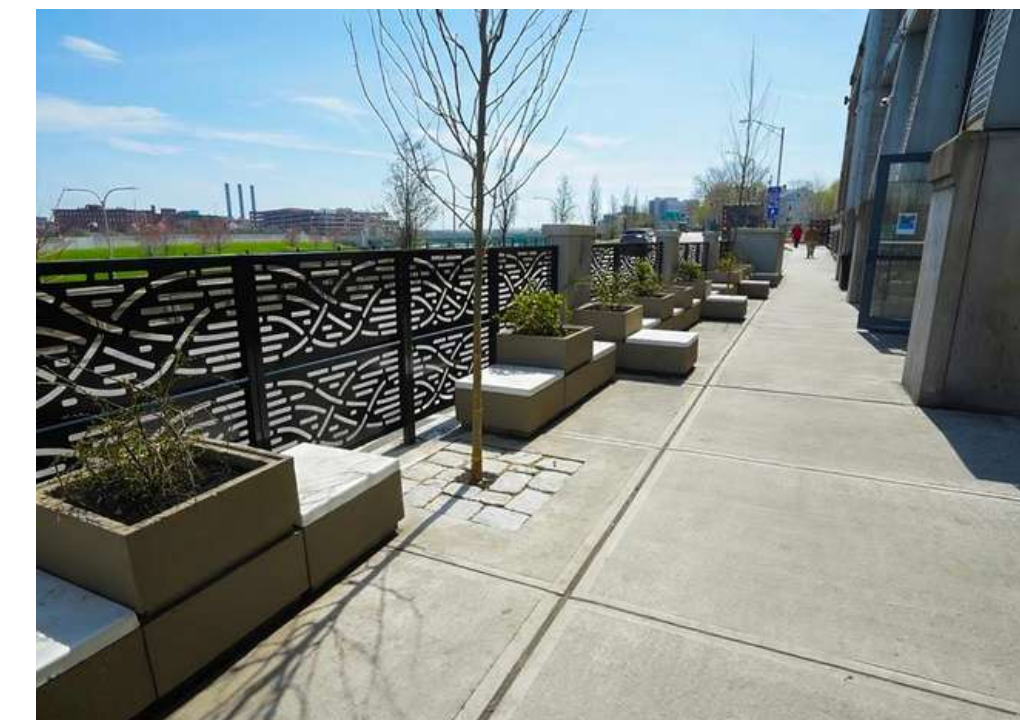
Phases I and II of the project included repointing the building’s brick façade and installing new safety and decorative lighting. Phase III, which was completed in early 2026, created three newly renovated outdoor spaces for clients and residents: the Women’s Shelter Courtyard, Main Entrance Streetscape, and a Day Client Courtyard.

Each of these spaces was designed to create a safe, welcoming environment where people can spend time outdoors with comfort and dignity.

Improvements include privacy fencing, benches, trees, and other landscaping elements that foster a sense of calm and community, including a sunshade in the Women’s Shelter Courtyard, and phone charging and water bottle filling stations in the Day Client Courtyard.

PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: KITE ARCHITECTS

At KITE Architects, design is about creating spaces that strengthen communities and improve lives. For more than two decades, KITE has been a valued partner in Crossroads' mission to help people experiencing homelessness secure stable homes, bringing thoughtful design and a deep understanding of affordable housing to many of our most transformative projects.

Since partnering with Crossroads in the early 2000s, KITE has helped shape developments including Crossroads Family Housing, Kingstown Crossings, and most recently, Summer Street Apartments and the reimagining of 160 Broad Street. Their team is also helping bring our future vision to life through the development of our upcoming Health & Housing building.

KITE understands that housing is more than a place to live—it is the foundation for health, stability, and opportunity. Their collaborative approach ensures that every project reflects the needs of the people who will call it home while supporting Crossroads' commitment to creating safe, affordable housing for Rhode Islanders in need.

Christine West and Albert Garcia, Principals and Co-Owners of KITE Architects, believe that expanding affordable housing is essential to addressing homelessness. Through thoughtful and innovative human-centered design, strong partnerships, and a shared commitment to community impact, KITE helps turn that vision into reality.

We are proud to spotlight KITE Architects as a mission-aligned partner. Together, we are creating housing that fosters dignity, promotes well-being, and helps ensure that more Rhode Islanders have the opportunity to build a stable future.

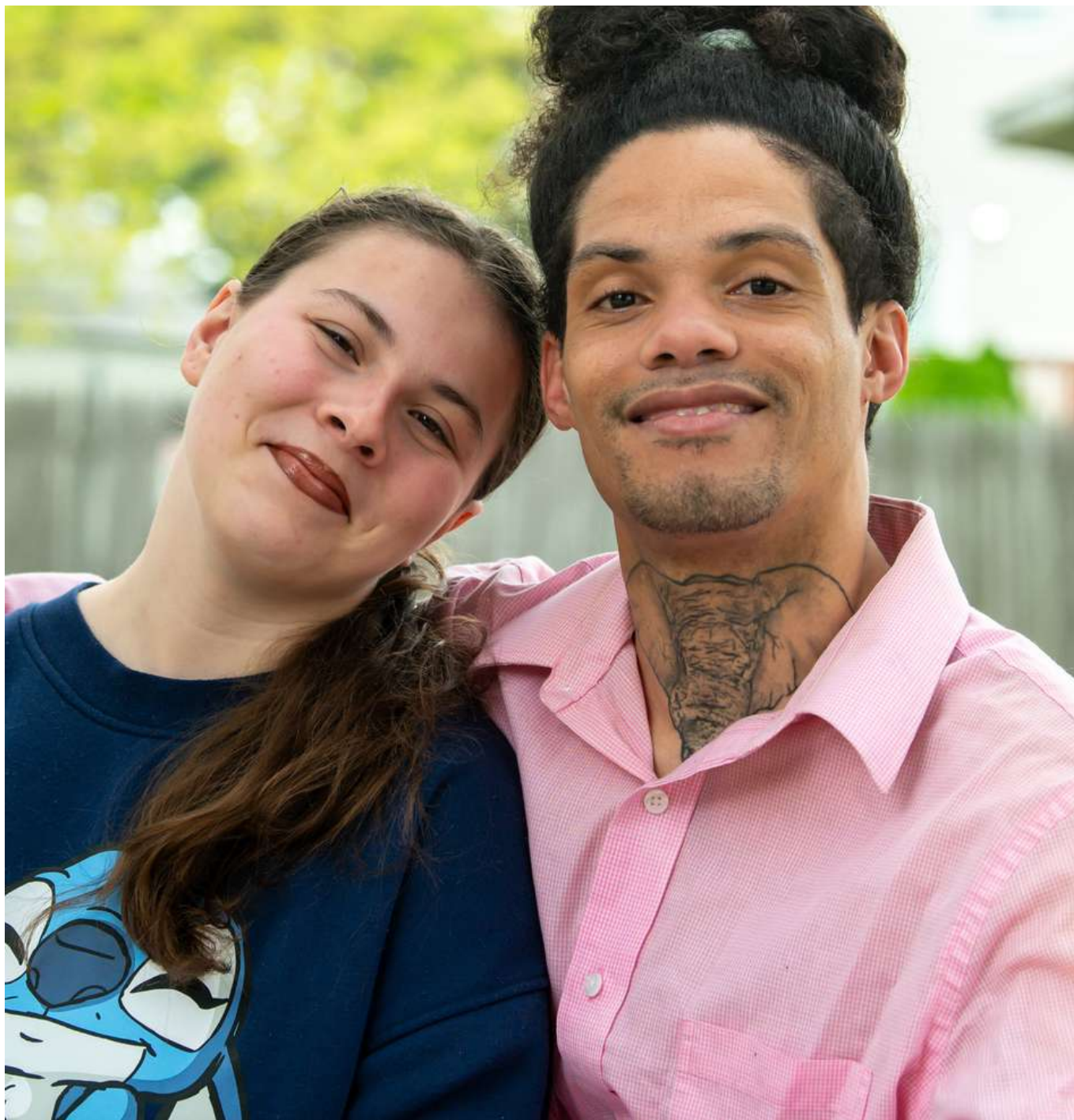


4,800 LIVES IMPACTED

As proud as we are of the progress we made creating more housing, our biggest accomplishment last year was the impact we had on the lives of those we served.

Of the nearly 8,100 people who experienced homelessness in Rhode Island in 2025, Crossroads was there to help more than 4,800 of them.

We strive to prevent homelessness when possible, provide temporary emergency shelter when needed, and support all of our clients as they work toward securing and maintaining stable housing.



HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION

HELPED 2,100+ PREVENT OR QUICKLY END THEIR HOMELESSNESS

It probably comes as no surprise that one of the most effective ways of addressing homelessness is to prevent it from happening in the first place.

For some, a small amount of support can make all the difference between remaining housed and falling into homelessness.

In 2025, Crossroads' Housing Problem Solving program helped more than 2,100 at-risk individuals and families either prevent or end their homelessness through personalized solutions such as security deposits, covering utility arrears, and other housing-related expenses. On average, each household received about \$3,100 in assistance.



TEMPORARY EMERGENCY SHELTER

NEARLY 1,600 PEOPLE ACCESSED OUR SHELTER PROGRAMS

When homelessness can't be prevented, temporary emergency shelter is sometimes needed as a short-term solution—and Crossroads provides more shelter beds than any other organization in the state.

In 2025, Crossroads provided more shelter beds than any other organization in Rhode Island.

Last year, more than 1,600 people, including 130 children, found a safe place to stay at one of the five temporary emergency shelters that we operate statewide, including:

- Harrington Hall, the largest men's shelter in the state (112 beds)
- Women's Shelter (41 beds)
- Family Shelter (53 beds)
- Domestic Violence Safehouse (23 beds)
- Hartford Avenue, the state's only shelter for couples (20 beds for 20 couples)

With homelessness hovering at near record levels, all of our shelters were at capacity last year—and on average, each shelter guest stayed with us about 104 days.

During one of the coldest and snowiest winters we can remember, our headquarters at 160 Broad Street in Providence also served as a Warming Center, providing as many as 100 people a night with a warm place to ride out the storms.

HOUSING

HELPED 2,300+ PEOPLE END THEIR HOMELESSNESS

While temporary emergency shelter plays a critical role in the state's homeless response system, helping individuals and families secure stable housing is at the heart of all that we do. We are proud to report that we helped more than 2,300 people end their homelessness last year.

Of those, 312 households received rental assistance and/or case management support through our Rapid Rehousing program, which allowed them to move into market-rate apartments.

Another 600 households moved into permanent supportive housing, often in properties owned by Crossroads. To ensure our ability to help our clients secure stable and affordable housing, we own and manage more than 375 permanent supportive apartments statewide, including:

- **Summer Street Apartments:** 176 apts., Providence
- **Beach Avenue:** 11 apts., Warwick
- **Crossroads Family Housing:** 35 apts., Providence
- **Harold Lewis House:** 14 SROs, West Warwick
- **Kingstown Crossings I and II:** 104 apts., N. Kingstown
- **Mike Terry Apartments:** 11 efficiencies, Providence
- **Travelers Aid Housing:** 16 apts., Providence

These apartments are deeply subsidized, allowing extremely low or no-income residents to live safely with the housing-based services and supports they need, for as long as they need them.

We also maintain strong working relationships with hundreds of local landlords.





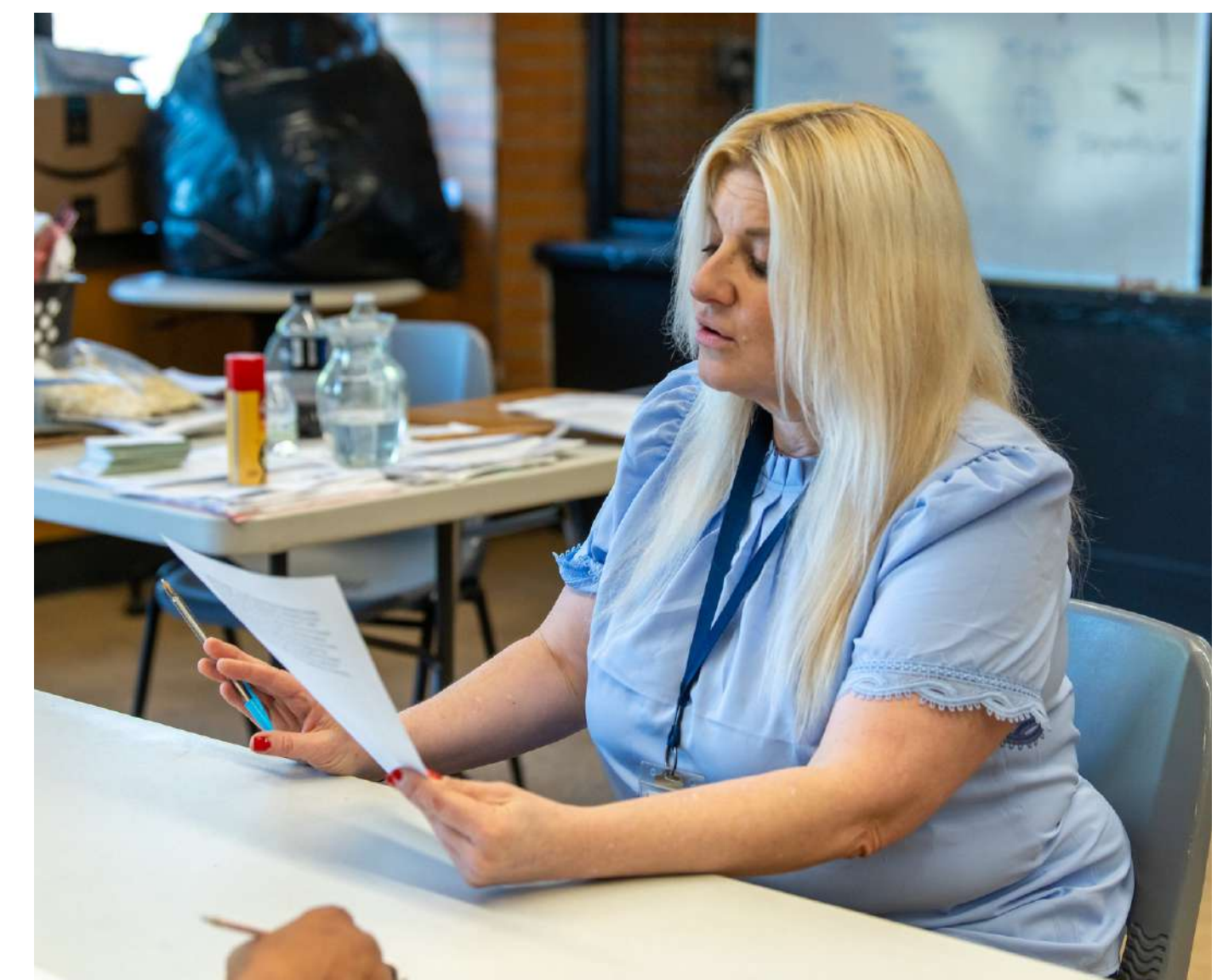
EDUCATION & EMPLOYMENT

241 PEOPLE PARTICIPATED IN ONE OR MORE OF OUR PROGRAMS

In addition to homelessness prevention, shelter, and housing, Crossroads also offers a broad range of Education and Employment programs designed to give people the skills they need to increase their earned income and maintain their housing.

Last year, 241 people participated in one or more programs to improve their literacy and math skills, work toward their high school equivalency, train for a career, or look for a job. Of those, 64 of our clients found new employment by the end of the calendar year.

Our Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) program, which was started in the 1990s, also celebrated its 165th graduating class last year, with many of our graduates working in hospitals, nursing homes, and healthcare organizations today.



MELISSA: A MOTHER WHO NEVER GAVE UP

Melissa's story is one of resilience, courage, and the life-changing impact of stable housing and compassionate support.

Growing up in Rhode Island, Melissa faced instability early on. Her mother struggled with mental health challenges, and her father—a loving, steady presence—tragically died from cancer when Melissa was just six. Forced to grow up quickly, she refused to give up on her future.

As an adult, Melissa built a career and started a family. However, her marriage became increasingly dangerous. Her husband grew verbally and physically abusive, culminating in a violent attack that left Melissa with severe head injuries. She stayed initially so her children wouldn't grow up fatherless, but ultimately found the courage to pack up and flee to protect them.

Shortly afterward, during the COVID-19 pandemic, ongoing medical issues caused Melissa to lose her job. Despite her best efforts, she soon found herself unemployed, without housing, and unsure where to turn.

That's when Melissa came to Crossroads. At our Family Shelter, she found safety, stability, and a team that believed in her. Supported by compassionate case managers, Melissa and her children soon transitioned into permanent supportive housing to rebuild their lives.

Today, Melissa and her family are thriving. Her children are pursuing higher education and careers, while Melissa works at a local bakery, moving forward with hope. Her journey is a powerful reminder that homelessness can happen to anyone—even a dedicated professional—and shows what is possible when people receive safe shelter and supportive services.

2025 FINANCIALS

FOR CROSSROADS AND SUBSIDIARIES*

Thanks to the generosity of our donors, partners, and government agencies, Crossroads and our subsidiaries raised or earned more than \$29.2M in operating revenue last year to support housing, shelter, and critical programs and services for those most in need in our community.

These resources came from a diverse mix of funding sources, including charitable giving, federal, state and city contracts, grants, rental income, management and developer’s fees, and investments.

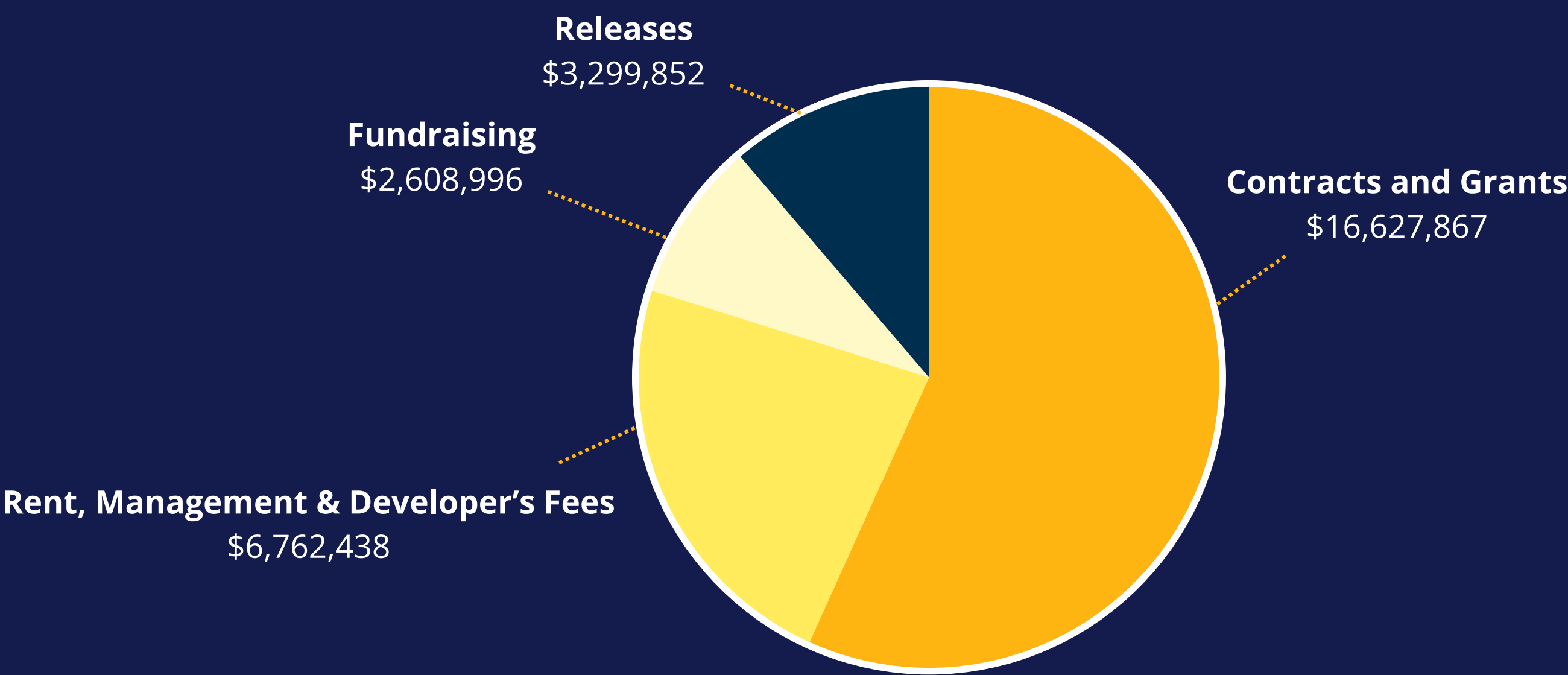
Total operating expenditures before depreciation were just over \$29M. To help sustain our operations and maximize impact, we also released \$700K in restricted grant funding awarded in prior years.

“Crossroads continues to demonstrate a strong alignment between financial performance and mission execution,” according to our independent auditor, Sandy, F. Ross, CPA, CFRE, MSNM, Partner, Nonprofit Services Group, KLR. “This growth not only sustains current operations but also enables strategic investment in expanding future housing capacity.

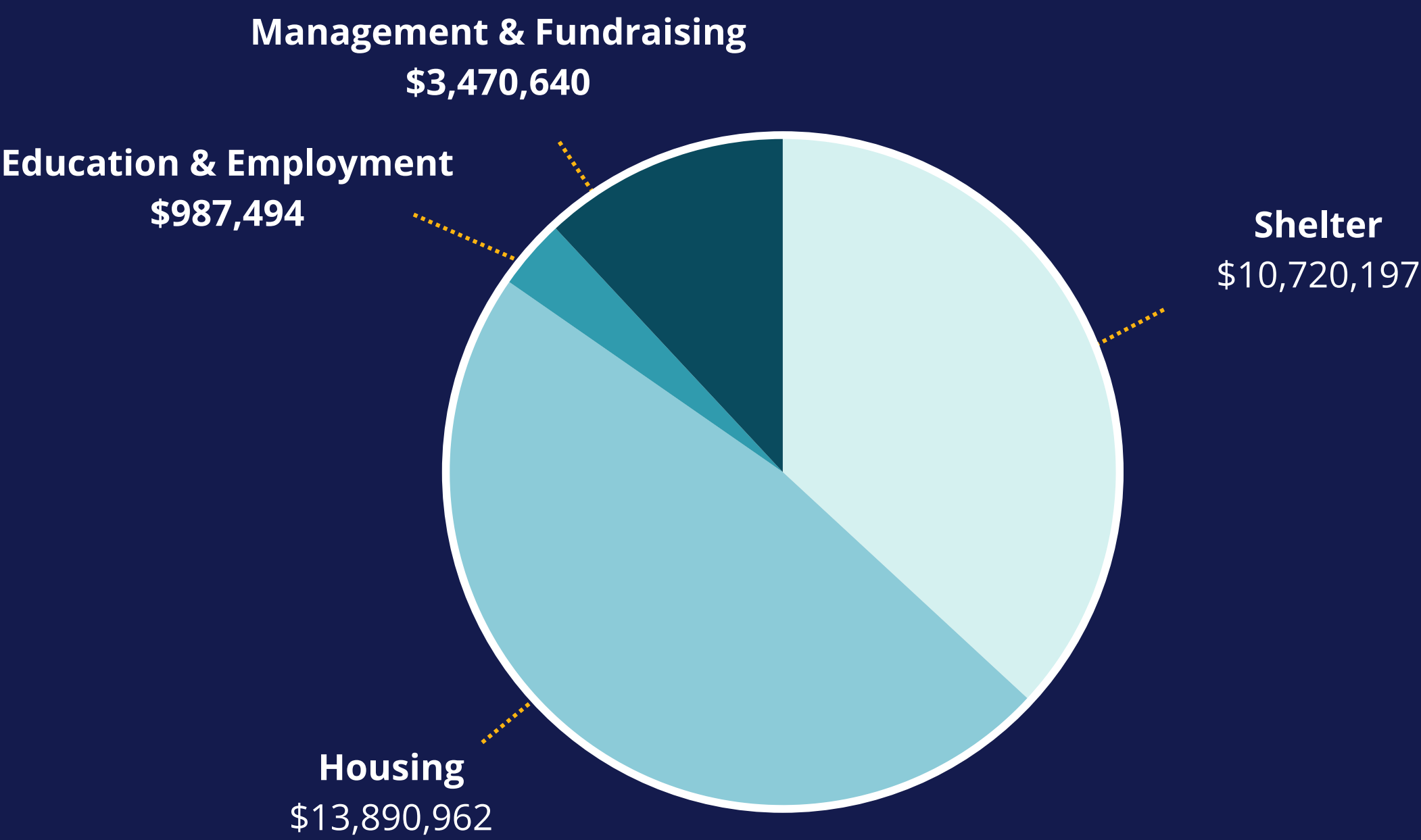

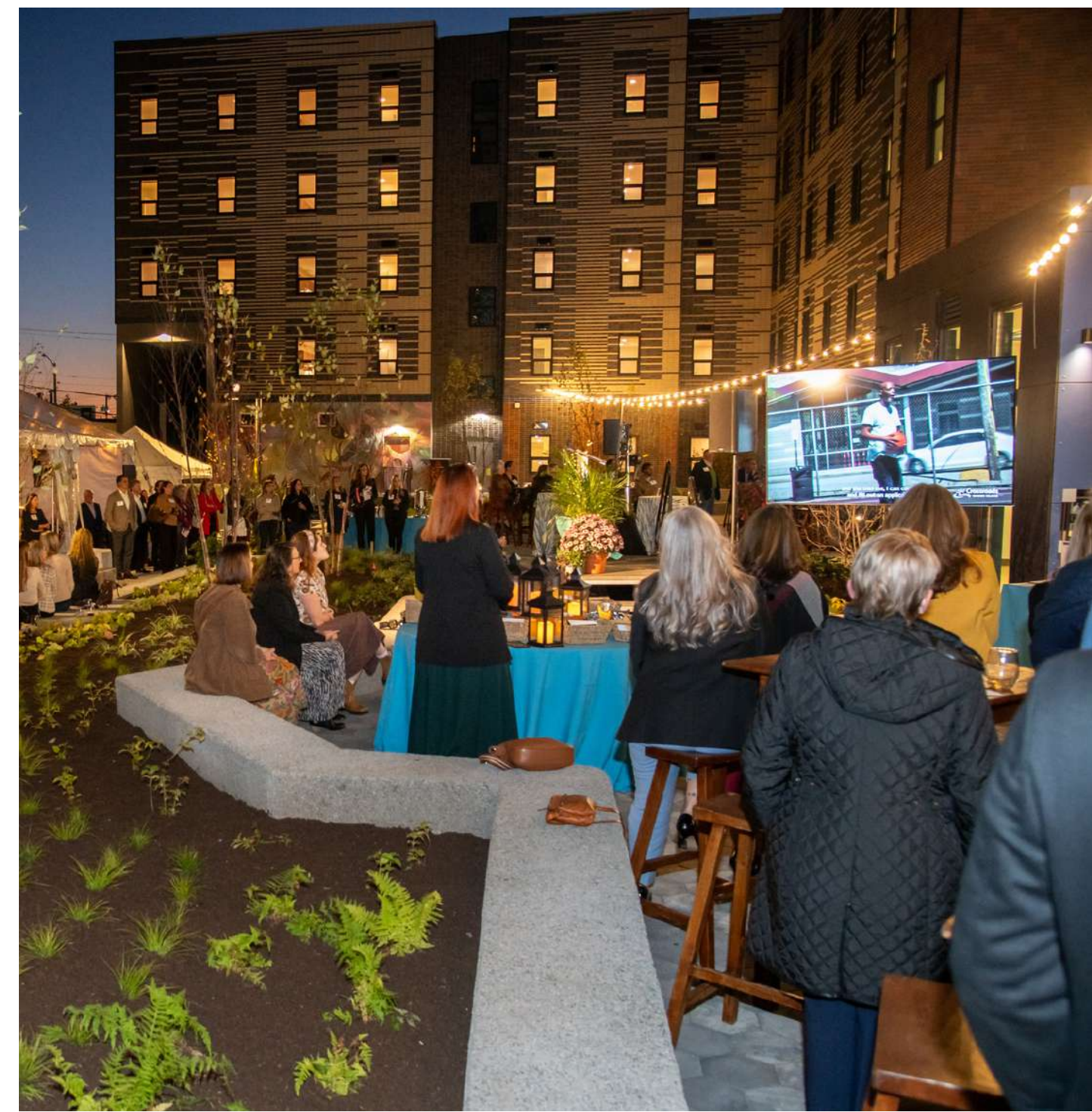
THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT

When donors and funders invest in Crossroads they can do so with confidence. Our organization has earned both Candid's Platinum Seal of Transparency and Charity Navigator's Four-Star rating—recognitions that reflect our commitment to openness, accountability, and responsible stewardship of every contribution.



Candid's Platinum Seal is its highest level of recognition for transparency and accountability, awarded to a small percentage of nonprofit organizations nationwide. Similarly, our Four-Star Charity Navigator rating recognizes strong financial health, sound governance, and adherence to leading nonprofit practices.

We are especially proud to report that 88% of all expenditures, or nearly \$25M, was spent on direct program support, ensuring that the vast majority of every dollar raised or earned supported individuals and families in need.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

BLUE CROSS & BLUE SHIELD OF RHODE ISLAND

Last September, Crossroads was proud to partner with Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Rhode Island (BCBSRI) for its 14th annual Blue across Rhode Island day of service.

With BCBSRI providing a \$5,000 grant and the energy of more than 30 volunteers, Live Well boxes were prepared for nearly 200 formerly homeless adults scheduled to move into Crossroads' newly constructed Summer Street Apartments at the end of 2025.

Thoughtfully curated with input from Crossroads residents, each box included essential kitchen and bathroom items designed to help new tenants settle in with dignity, prepare meals, care for themselves, and begin making their apartments feel like home. Packed with care and stored until move-in, these boxes reflected the kind of thoughtful support that helps turn housing into a true fresh start.

When residents arrived at their new apartments, the Live Well boxes were waiting inside with the essentials they needed from day one. We are deeply grateful for BCBSRI's continued partnership and for the dedication of its BlueAngel volunteers, whose generosity and service helped create stronger beginnings for our Summer Street residents and a stronger community for us all.

PROTECTING THOSE WE SERVE



We made incredible progress advancing proven solutions to ending homelessness last year. At the same time, we remain deeply concerned that federal policy changes and funding cuts will reverse decades of progress and push more than 170,000 Americans out of permanent housing and back into homelessness.

“HUD is turning its back on decades of evidence showing what works,” said Michelle Wilcox, Crossroads President & CEO. “The research is clear: housing is the most effective solution to ending homelessness, and we should be strengthening these programs, not dismantling them.”

For the last 40 years, federal investment has helped communities create permanent housing for veterans, older adults, people with disabilities, and individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The Administration’s policy changes, however, would significantly reduce federal funding for homeless services and shift resources away from permanent supportive housing in favor of temporary interventions such as emergency shelter and transitional housing.

Equally troubling, HUD’s recent Notice of Funding Opportunity also included unlawful conditions that create barriers for organizations with DEI programs—or those operating in sanctuary cities such as Providence—from even applying for funding.

In response, Crossroads joined nonprofit organizations and municipalities nationwide and challenged those conditions in federal court, which is something we never imagined we’d have to do. While the U.S. District Court subsequently ruled in our favor, agreeing that HUD's funding conditions were unlawful, the future of federal funding remains uncertain.

If enacted, the Administration’s policy changes would fundamentally reshape the federal response to homelessness and place greater responsibility on states and local communities. This would leave homeless services providers like Crossroads increasingly reliant on state, local and private partners to sustain our work.

“We may need to adapt, but no matter what happens, our commitment to permanent housing will never change,” Michelle concluded. “Housing is—and always has been—the only proven solution to ending homelessness. We will continue fighting for the safety, stability, and well-being of the people we serve, because everyone deserves a safe place to call home.”
